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Introduction

On September 1, 1973, the OSBI assumed the statewide administration of the UCR Program in Oklahoma. When the OSBI assumed administration of the program, there were approximately 260 agencies reporting their crime statistics to the OSBI. As of December 31, 2021, there are 439 local law enforcement agencies reporting crime statistics, and the OSBI subsequently submits this crime data to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

Traditionally, the FBI's UCR Program accepted data via the Summary Reporting System (SRS). However, as of January 1, 2021, the FBI no longer accepts SRS data and now only accepts incident-based reporting data compatible with the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). With the changes at the federal level, local law enforcement agencies in Oklahoma transitioned from submitting their crime data via SRS to submitting data into Oklahoma's State Incident-Based Reporting System (SIBRS), which OSBI maintains in addition to the SRS.

In the SRS data collection, data was collected for only eight crimes and included a Hierarchy Rule to determine which offense is reported when an incident involved more than one. For example, if a Murder and an Aggravated Assault occur in a single incident, the Hierarchy Rule determines that only the Murder is reported into the SRS database. In contrast, the incident-based reporting collects data for 52 unique Group A offenses and 11 Group B offenses, and instead of using a Hierarchy Rule, NIBRS/SIBRS allows reporting of up to 10 offenses in a single incident. Additionally, SIBRS data collection is capable of linking an arrest directly to an incident, and the reporting agency can specify if the crime was attempted or completed. Overall, the SIBRS data collection gathers more detailed information on each incident's victim(s), offense(s), and offender(s). Examples of more detailed include but are not limited to victim-to-offender relationships, drug types, premise types, and property stolen and/or damaged.

Beginning with Crime in Oklahoma, 2021, the report will use data reported to the SIBRS database. Due to this change, the data included in this document has changed, and includes data reported for the 52 Group A offenses, 11 Group B offenses, as well as special categories such as Domestic Abuse, Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted, and Hate/Bias Crime.

Legislative Mandate

The *Crime in Oklahoma* report includes information provided by law enforcement agencies for known offenses. The Oklahoma Legislature mandated the responsibility and authority for UCR data collection and dissemination to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. Requirements established through <u>Title 74 O.S. § 150.10</u> are as follows:

A uniform crime reporting system shall be established by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. The Director shall have the power and duty, when directed by the Commission, to collect and gather such information from such state agencies as may be prescribed in Section 150.1, et seq. of this title.

The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigations is hereby designated as the agency which shall collect, gather, assemble, and collate such information as prescribed by this section.

- 1. All state, county, city, and town law enforcement agencies shall submit reports to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation on forms prescribed by the Bureau. The reports shall contain the number and nature of offenses committed within their respective jurisdictions, the disposition of such matters, and such other information as the Bureau may require, respecting information relating to the cause and prevention of crime, recidivism, the rehabilitation of criminals and the proper administration of criminal justice.
- 2. Any information taken from such information, data, records or reports submitted to the uniform crime reporting system and used to prepare the Uniform Crime Report shall be an open record pursuant to the Oklahoma Open Records Act. Requests for such information shall be submitted to the Bureau.
- 3. Any request under the Oklahoma Open Records Act for any other information, data, records or reports submitted to the uniform reporting system by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation shall be directed to the Bureau pursuant to Section 24A.20 of Title 51 of the Oklahoma Statutes. Such information, data, records or reports shall be considered investigative records of the Bureau and shall be subject to discovery and disclosure only in compliance with Section 150.5 of this title or other applicable statute.
- 4. Any requests under the Oklahoma Open Records Act for more information, data, records or reports submitted by a law enforcement agency other than the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation to the uniform crime reporting system shall be directed to the law

enforcement agency submitting the information, data, records or reports to the Bureau unit pursuant to Section 24A.20 of Title 51 of the Oklahoma Statutes. Such information, data records or reports shall be considered law enforcement records and shall be subject to discovery and disclosure only in compliance with Section24A.8 of Title 51 of the Oklahoma Statues or other applicable statute.

Upon receipt of such information the Director shall have such data collated and formulated and shall compile such statistics as the Director may deem necessary in order to present a proper classification and analysis of the volume and nature of crime and the administration of criminal justice within this state.

Refusal or persistent failure of any law enforcement agency to submit reports required by this section may result in discontinued access to Bureau information and assistance.

Statement of Policy

The following regulations will be observed by this agency concerning the release of statistical information. Employees of the agency will observe these procedures and will not deviate from this policy without the express consent of the Director of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. All Information to be released will originate from the Field Services Unit of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation.

Policy:

- 1. This agency will publish an annual report reflecting crime in Oklahoma. This report will be distributed to the Governor, members of the Legislature, the Attorney General, law enforcement agencies, the State Library System, and to any agency or committee dedicated to law enforcement or criminal justice work. An electronic copy of the report will be made available on the OSBI website.
- 2. Published annual reports will be released to the above-named agencies at no charge. They will then be released to individuals or agencies extraneous to the criminal justice community who shall pay a fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for every copy received.

3. Data Requests

- a. Information contained in the published annual report may be released via telephone, letter, etc. to any interested party.
- b. All requests for unpublished information from the agencies or individuals extraneous to the criminal justice community should be submitted to the Statistical Analysis Center (SAC). In accordance with the Oklahoma Open Records Act, all requests may be subject to a charge. Standard practice is to provide data in a PDF or hard copy format to prevent manipulation of data. Exceptions to this practice can be submitted to the director of the SAC for consideration.
- c. Law enforcement agencies may receive interim, unpublished, specialized reports identifying their agency only, provided the request is reasonable. Law enforcement agencies may also receive their respective county totals along with other state or regional totals. All requests should be directed to the supervisor of the Field Services Unit.

Reporting and Collection Procedures

As described in the Legislative Mandate section, all state, county, and town law enforcement agencies are required to submit crime data to the OSBI. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses for Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, Crimes Against Society, and Group B offenses. Crime counts include "actual offenses known" without regard to (1) whether anyone is arrested for the crime; (2) whether the stolen property is recovered; (3) the local prosecution policy; and (4) any other restrictive considerations. Law enforcement agencies also report clearance data either by an arrest or by an exceptional means (a crime solution or clearance recorded when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against the offender(s)). This report contains demographic information for victims (where applicable) and arrestees. As required by Titles 74 O.S. §150.12B and 21 O.S. §850, SIBRS offenses are reported for domestic abuse and hate/bias motivation crimes.

Objectives:

The fundamental objectives of the Oklahoma UCR Program are:

- (1) Inform the Governor, Legislature, other governmental officials, and the public as to the nature, magnitude, and trends of crime in Oklahoma.
- (2) Provide law enforcement administrators with statistics for administrative and operational use.
- (3) Provide offender demographics in order to find the proper focus for crime prevention and law enforcement.
- (4) Provide data and statistics for research to improve the efficiency, effectiveness, and performance of criminal justice agencies.
- (5) Provide the FBI with complete incident-based reporting data to be included in the national publication *Crime in the United States*.

Verification:

A primary consideration in the collection of criminal statistics in Oklahoma is the uniformity and accuracy of crime data. While the Field Services Unit (FSU) at OSBI provides training and technical assistance to local law enforcement, the accuracy of crime data included in this report cannot be guaranteed. Incident reports uploaded from external record management systems must meet the state's minimum requirements for submission before being accepted into the state repository. Incident reports that are not validated or properly corrected are not

included in this report. Throughout the year, FSU representatives work with reporting agencies to correct reporting errors. Ongoing communication (phone, email, and in person) with reporting agencies is essential to ensure the accuracy and quality of reporting.

Crime Factors:

This report includes data reported to the OSBI through the State Incident-Based Reporting System (SIBRS) as of August 18-24, 2022. Due to SIBRS being a live database, data could be subject to change if queried after August 18-24, 2022. Data provided in this report is based on offenses known to law enforcement; however, victims do not always report crime to law enforcement. For that reason, the OSBI cautions against using the data reported to make direct comparisons among jurisdictions in the State or Nation. Offense data is reported for an event which may include several offenses, multiple, offenders, and/or multiple victims. As a result, direct comparisons between offense, arrest, and victim data may be misleading. Individuals involved in an incident could be linked to multiple crimes as well. Additionally, other factors may influence the amount of crime reported across jurisdictions, including:

- Population density and urbanization
- Compositions of the population, particularly in refences to age
- Relative stability of population, especially concerning commuting patterns
- Transportation and highways
- Socioeconomic conditions, such as median household income, poverty, and unemployment
- Culture factors: education, recreational, and religious makeup
- Family dynamics and structure
- Climate
- Effective strength of local law enforcement
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency
- Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts
- Public opinion toward crime
- Crime reporting practices of victims and citizens.

Counting Methodology

As previously mentioned, SIBRS is a more complex data collection, and as a result, there are a multitude of ways to count data submitted. For that reason, the Statistical Analysis Center has outlined methodology below for how data in the report was counted.

For crime reporting purposes, the total number of crimes are counted in the following way:

- Crimes Against Persons are counted by the number of <u>unique</u> victims of a crime against a person.
- Crimes Against Property are counted by the number of <u>unique</u> crimes against property
 offense types, with the exception of Motor Vehicle Thefts. Motor Vehicles Thefts are
 counted by the number of attempted Motor Vehicle Thefts <u>plus</u> the number of unique
 motor vehicles stolen.
- Crimes Against Society are counted by the number of <u>unique</u> crimes against society offense types.
- Group B offenses are counted by the number of <u>unique</u> offenders of a Group B offense
 who had an <u>arrest date</u> in the calendar year of 2021.

The numbers in each section may differ dependent on the data element. Below are brief descriptions for how specific data elements were counted:

- Month, Day of Week, Time of Day are counted in the same manner as listed above for each crime category.
- Victim specific information such as victim type, demographics, relationship types, and injury types are counted by the <u>unique</u> victim.
- Arrestee information (i.e., demographics) are counted in the same manner as described above for Group B crimes.
- Offense specific information such as weapon type, premise type, and criminal/gang activity are counted by each <u>unique</u> offense type regardless of crime category.
- Property loss, value, and type are counted by the <u>unique</u> property item.

Crimes Against Persons

Section 1

Summary:

The following section provides the number of victims, offenses, and arrestees for each Crime Against Persons. Per crime reporting standards set by the FBI, Crimes Against Persons is counted by the number of <u>unique</u> victims per offense (Table 1). As mentioned in the <u>Reporting and Collection Procedures</u> section, victims and arrestees can be linked to more than one offense. Crimes Against Persons include offenses that involve a person, such as Aggravated Assault and Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 62,024 unique victims of Crimes Against Persons. The most common offense categories reported in 2021 were Assault Offenses (90.7%), Forcible Sex Offenses (7.3%), and Kidnapping/Abduction (1.1%) (Table 1). The least common offenses categories reported were Human Trafficking Offenses (0.04%), Non-Forcible Sex Offenses (0.3%), and Homicide Offenses (0.5%). More specifically, the most common offense reported was Simple Assault (52.1%), and the least common offenses reported was Human Trafficking - Involuntary Servitude (0.005%).

Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter

Definition: The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 246 unique offenses of Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter, of those offenses, there were 269 unique victims of Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter. The highest number of Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughters occurred in September, with 30 victims (Figure 1). The most common day of the week reported was Saturday, with 56 victims (Figure 2). Midnight (00:00 – 00:59) was the most common time of day reported for Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter with 25 victims (Figure 4). It should be noted if the reporting agency did not know when a crime occurred, the hour of 00:00 – 00:59 may be used as an unknown time.




Figure 3. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Murder & Non-Negligent Manslaughter

The majority of victims were reported as Male, representing 202 of the 269 individuals. For victims, the most common race reported was White, with 140, and the most common ethnicity was Non-Hispanic, with 133 victims. The most common age of victims was between 20 and 29 years old (Table 2). In 2021, there were 360 victim-to-offender relationships reported; the most common of which was Outside of Family but Known to Victim (Figure 3).

The 269 victims occurred as a result of 246 unique offenses of Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter. Of all offenses, the majority occurred at a Living Place (62.2%) or on/at a Public Transportation/Roadways (21.1%) (Table 3). There were 246 criminal/gang activities; the majority (89.0%) of activities were reported as None/Unknown. The remaining activities (11.0%) were reported as Other Gang (10.2%) or Juvenile Gang (0.8%). In 2021, there were 256 weapon types reported (Table 4). The most common weapon type used was Firearms (68.0%), followed by Objects (15.2%), Physical (6.6%), Other (4.3%), Unknown (3.1%), and Chemical (2.7%).

In 2021, there were 148 unique arrestees associated with a Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter offense. The majority of arrestees were reported as Male (Table 2), and the most races reported were Black (67 arrestees) and White (65 arrestees). Non-Hispanic was the most common (47.3%) ethnicity reported in 2021, followed by Unknown (36.5%) and Hispanic (16.2%). Over 50.0% of arrestees were between the ages of 20 and 39 years old (Table 2).

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Figure 2. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Murder & Non-Negligent Manslaughter



Negligent Manslaughter

Definition: The killing of another person through gross negligence.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 48 unique offenses of Negligent Manslaughter, of those offenses, there were 49 unique victims of Negligent Manslaughter. In 2021, the highest number of Negligent Manslaughters occurred in October (8 victims), occurred on a Saturday (12 victims), and occurred between 23:00 and 23:59 (7 victims).




Figure 7. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Negligent Manslaughter

Over 50.0% of victims were reported as Male (Table 6). Of the 49 victims, the most common race reported was White (32 victims), followed by Black (11), Unknown (4) and American Indian/Alaskan Native (2). For 57.1% of victims, the ethnicity was reported as Unknown, and the majority (22.4%) were between the ages of 20 and 29 years old. There were 55 victim-to-offender relations, the most common (60.0%) were Not Known by Victim (Figure 7).

The 49 victims occurred as a result of 48 unique offenses of Negligent Manslaughter. A majority (68.8%) of offenses occurred on Public Transportation/Roadways. The most common weapon type reported was Objects (67.3%) followed by firearms (24.5%) (Table 7). Approximately 95.0% of offenses had a criminal/gang activity reported as None/Unknown.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 27 unique arrestees of Negligent Manslaughter. The majority of arrestees were reported as Male (70.4%) with the remaining individuals reported as Female. Of the 27 arrestees, the most common race reported was White (55.6%), and the most common ethnicity was Unknown (51.9%) (Table 2). A majority (77.7%) of arrestees were between 20 and 49 years old.

Figure 5. Number of Victims per Month, Negligent Manslaughter




Figure 6. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Negligent Manslaughter





Figure 8. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Negligent Manslaughter






Figure 9. Number of Victims per Time of Day, Negligent Manslaughter

Justifiable Homicide

Definition: The killing of a perpetrator of a serious criminal offense by a peace officer in the line of duty, or the killing, during the commission of a serious criminal offense, of the perpetrator by a private individual. It should be noted that Justifiable Homicide is not considered a crime, but is included in crime reporting. Therefore, in 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 11 unique offenses of Justifiable Homicide, of those offenses, there were 11 unique victims of a Justifiable Homicide offense.

Figure 10. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Justifiable Homicide




Figure 11. Number of Victims per Month, Justifiable Homicide






Aggravated Assault

Definition: An unlawful attack by one person upon another wherein the offender uses a dangerous weapon or displays it in a threatening manner or the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury, or where there was a risk for serious injury/intent to seriously injure.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 10,892 unique offenses of Aggravated Assault, of those offenses, there were 12,523 unique victims of Aggravated Assault. The highest number of Aggravated Assaults occurred in June (10.1%), and 33.1% of victims were assaulted on a Saturday or Sunday. The most common time of offense was 00:00–00:59; however, it should be noted this time range could signify an unknown time.

Of the 12,523 victims, 97.7% were reported as an Individual, and 2.3% were reported as a Law Enforcement Officer. The reported sex of victims was nearly 50:50, with 50.4% Male, 47.5% were Female, and 2.1% were Unknown (Table 12). Roughly 60% of victims were White and 27.8% were Black. Of all victims, 94.4% were reported as either an Unknown ethnicity (53.4%) or were reported as Non-Hispanic (41.0%). The most common age range reported was 20–29 years old, followed by 30–39 years old (Table 12) Of the 13,412 injuries reported, the most common was None (6,236), followed by Apparent Minor Injuries (Table 13). There were 14,702 victim-to-offender relationship types reported in 2021, and the most common was Outside of Family but Known to Victim (6,588).

The 12,523 victims occurred as a result of 10,892 unique offenses of Aggravated Assault. The most common location of Aggravated Assault was Living Place, representing 62.5% of offenses (Table 14). There were 11,667 weapon types reported for Aggravated Assault in 2021. The most common type of weapon reported was Objects, which can include weapons such as Knife/Cutting Instruments, Blunt Objects, Motor Vehicles. There were 10,893 types of criminal/gang activity reported, and the majority were reported as None/Unknown (10,365), followed by Other Gang (483) and Juvenile Gang, (45).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 3,833 unique arrestees of Aggravated Assault. Of the 3,833 arrestees, most (79.8%) were reported as Male (Table 12). More than half (56.5%) of arrestees were White, 31.5% were Black, 9.3% were American Indian/Alaskan Native, 1.7% were Unknown, 0.8% were Asian, and 0.2% were Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander. For arrestees of Aggravated Assault, the most common ethnicity reported was Non-Hispanic (56.8%). Of all arrestees, 57.6% were between the ages of 20 to 39 years old (Table 12).

Figure 13. Number of Victims per Month, Aggravated Assault




Figure 14. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Aggravated Assault




Figure 15. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Aggravated Assault




Simple Assault

Definition: An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a dangerous weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 28,989 unique offenses, of those offenses, there were 32,305 unique victims of Simple Assault. July was the most common month (Figure 17), Saturday and Sunday were the most common days (Figure 18), and the most common time of offense was between 00:00 and 00:59 (Figure 20).




Figure 19. Number of Victims-to-Offender Relationships, Simple Assault

Of the 32,305 victims, 97.2% were reported as an Individual, and 2.8% were reported as a Law Enforcement Officer. Of the 32,305 victims, 19,710 were reportedly Female, 11,736 were reportedly Male, and 859 were reported as an Unknown sex. For race, nearly 70.0% of victims were reported as White (Table 17), and the ethnicity for victims reported nearly even between Non-Hispanic (47.4%) and Unknown (47.6%). Over 40.0% of victims were reportedly between the ages of 20 and 39 years old (Table 17). There were 32,322 types of injuries reported with the most common injury reported as None (50.5%), followed by Apparent Minor Injury (49.5%) (Table 18). In 2021, there were 37,263 victim-to-offender relationships reported with the most common relationships reported in the Outside of Family but Known to Victim category (Figure 19).




Figure 20. Number of Victims per Time of Day, Simple Assault

The 28,989 victims occurred as a result of 28,989 unique offenses of Simple Assault. The most common location where offenses Occurred was Living Place, representing 69.0% of premise types (Figure 20). There were 29,270 weapon types reported in 2021, and the most common weapon type was Physical (i.e., Personal Weapons (Hands, Fists, etc.), asphyxiation) (Table 19). There were 28,990 criminal/gang activities reported in 2021, with None/Unknown representing 28,312 of activities. The remaining activities were reported as Juvenile Gang (77) and Other Gang (601).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 8,591 unique arrestees for Simple Assault (Table 17), and of those, 72.5% were Male and the remaining (27.5%) were Female. The majority of arrestees were reported as either White (61.1%) or Black (26.5%). The most common ethnicity reported for arrestees was Non-Hispanic (61.5%). Lastly, 58.9% were between the ages of 20 and 39 years old.

Figure 18. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Simple Assault

Intimidation

Definition: To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct without displaying a dangerous weapon or subjecting the victim to an actual physical attack.




Figure 22. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Intimidation

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 11,417 unique victims of Intimidation. When comparing each month, the highest number of Intimidations reportedly occurred in September; however, other common months included March, April, May, June, and August (Figure 21). The most common day of week reported was Monday (1,870) (Figure 22), and the most common time of day reported was 00:00–00:59 (1,053) (Figure 24).




Figure 23. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Intimidation

Of the 11,417 victims, 11,344 victims were reported as an individual and 73 victims were reported as a law enforcement officer. The most common sex of Intimidation victims was Female (6,856), followed by Male (4,165) and Unknown (396). The majority (71.1%) of victims were reported as White (Table 21), and the most common ethnicity reported for victims was Unknown (6,055). In 2021, most (73.9%) of Intimidation victims were between the ages of 20 and 59 years old. There were 12,450 victim-to-offender relationships with most relationships reported as Outside of the Family but Known to the Victim (Figure 23).

The 11,417 occurred as a result of 10,186 unique offenses of Intimidation. Of all Intimidations, the majority occurred at a Living Place, which can include premises such as Hotel/Motel and Residence/Home (Table 22). The majority (97.4%) of criminal/gang activities were reported as None/Unknown, with the remaining two activities (Juvenile Gang and Other Gang), accounting for 2.7% of offenses (Figure 23).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 804 unique arrestees of Intimidation. Of the 804 arrestees, 84.8% were Male and 15.2% were Female. The most common race reported for arrestees was White (62.9%) (Table 21). Of all arrestees, 60.9% were reported with an ethnicity of Non-Hispanic. Lastly, 52.7% of all arrestees were either between the ages of 20-29 years old (26.2%) or 30-39 years old (26.5%).

Figure 21. Number of Victims per Month, Intimidation





Figure 24. Number of Victims per Time of Day, Intimidation

Forcible Rape

Definition: The carnal knowledge of a person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is unable to give consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.




Figure 26. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Forcible Rape





Figure 28. Number of Victims per Time of Day, Forcible Rape

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 1,714 unique offenses of Forcible Rape, of those offenses, there were 1,751 unique victims of Forcible Rape. The highest number of Forcible Rapes occurred in September (Figure 25). The most common day of week reported was Friday (17.2%) (Figure 26), and the most common time of day was between 00:00 and 00:59 (Figure 28)

Of the 1,751 victims, 1,703 were reported as Female and 48 were reported as Male. The most common race reported for victims was White (Table 24), and the common ethnicity reported for victims was Unknown (49.9%). Unlike the previous Crimes Against Persons, 39.3%, or 688 victims, were Under 18 years old. There were 1,785 injury types reported in 2021, and the most common injury type was None (no injury) (Table 25). In 2021, there were 1,925 victim-to-offender relationships reported, and of those, 56.8% were reported in the Outside of Family but Known to Victim category (Figure 27).

The 1,751 unique victims were the result of 1,714 unique offenses of Forcible Rape. The most common premise type reported where a Forcible rape occurred was Living Place, representing 1,323 offenses. There were 1,736 weapon types reported with a Forcible Rape offense, and the most common type was Physical (Personal Weapons (Hands, Feet, etc.) and Asphyxiation) (Figure 27). Of the three types of criminal/gang activity: 96.6% were None/Unknown, 2.7% were Other Gang and 0.8% were Juvenile Gang.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 109 unique arrestees of Forcible Rape. The majority (94.5%) of arrestees were reportedly Male with the remaining 5.5% reported as Female. The most common race of arrestees was White, representing 62.4% of all arrestees (Table 24). Of the three types of ethnicities available for reporting, 68.8% were reported as Non-Hispanic, followed by Unknown (20.2%) and Hispanic (11.0%). The majority of arrestees (29.4%) were reportedly between 30 to 39 years old.

Figure 25. Number of Victims per Month, Forcible Rape

Figure 27. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Forcible Rape

Forcible Sodomy

Definition: Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is unable to give consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 366 unique offenses of Forcible Sodomy, of those offenses, there were 409 unique victims of Forcible Sodomy. March was the most common month of offense (Figure 29). Friday was the most common day of week reported representing 18.8% of victims (Figure 30), and the most common hour of the day reported was 00:00 – 00:59, representing 21.8% of victims (Figure 32).




Figure 31. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Forcible Sodomy

For victims, the most common sex was Female (60.4%) (Table 29). The most common race reported for victims was White, 287 victims, and over half (57.7%) of victims were reported as an Unknown ethnicity. Similar to Forcible Rape, the most common age range reported was Under 18 years old, representing 58.9% of victims (Table 29). There were 413 types of injury reported in 2021, with the most common type reported as None (i.e., no injury) (Table 30). In 2021, there were 451 victim-to-offender relationships reported with the most common relationship types reported in the following categories: Within the Family (36.4%) and Outside of the Family but Known to the Victim (42.6%) (Figure 31).

In 2021, the 409 victims law enforcement agencies reported were the result of 366 unique offenses of Forcible Sodomy. Of those offenses, 359 offenses were reported as Completed and 7 offenses were reported as Attempted. The most common premise type where Forcible Sodomy occurred was a Living Place (Table 31). There were 366 criminal/gang activities reported for Forcible Sodomy. As observed with other offenses, the majority of activities were reported as None/Unknown (97.5%), while Other Gang and Juvenile Gang accounted for 1.9% and 0.5% of offenses, respectively. In 2021, there were 373 types of weapons reported for a Forcible Sodomy offense, the most common (67.3%) weapon type used was Physical (i.e., Personal Weapons, Asphyxiation) (Table 32).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 30 unique arrestees of Forcible Sodomy. Of the 30 arrestees, 28 were reportedly Male and 2 were reportedly Female. The most common race (76.7%) reported for arrestees was White (Table 29). Sixty percent of arrestees were reportedly Non-Hispanic while the remaining were reported as Hispanic (20.0%) or Unknown (20.0%). Over 70.0% of arrestees were reportedly between 20 and 49 years old.

Figure 29. Number of Victims per Month, Forcible Sodomy




Figure 30. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Forcible Sodomy




Sexual Assault with an Object

Definition: To use an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is unable to give consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.




Figure 34. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Sexual Assault with an Object

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 221 unique offenses of Sexual Assault with an Object, of those offenses, there were 240 unique victims of Sexual Assault with an Object. The most common month reported for when a Sexual Assault with an Object occurred was January with 32 victims (Figure 33). The highest number (18.8%) of Sexual Assaults with an Object occurred on a Tuesday (Figure 34), and the most common time of day was 00:00 – 00:59, 15.0% of victims (Figure 36). However, 00:00-00:59 could indicate an unknown time frame for when the assault occurred.






Figure 35. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Sexual Assault with an

For victims, the most common sex of victims was Female (84.6%). Over 75.0% of victims were reported as White, and for 50.8% of victims the ethnicity was reported as Unknown. Nearly 50.0% of Sexual Assault with an Object victims were reportedly Under 18 years old (Table 34). There were 245 injuries reported in 2021, and the most common injury type reported was None, 178 victims (Table 35). In 2021, there were 271 victim-to-offender relationships, the majority of relationships were reported in the Outside of Family but Known to the Victim category (Figure 35).

The 240 victims of Sexual Assault with an Object were the result of 221 unique offenses reported by law enforcement agencies in 2021. Of the 221 offenses, 218 offenses were reported as completed and 3 offenses were reported as attempted. The most common premise type reported for where Sexual Assaults with an Object occurred was a Living Place (Table 36). There were 221 criminal/gang activities reported in 2021, the majority (96.8%) of activities were reported as None/Unknown (Table 38). There were 225 weapon types reported with a Sexual Assault with an Object, and the most common weapon type was Physical (i.e., Personal Weapons) (Table 37).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 27 unique arrestees of Sexual Assault with an Object. Of the 27 arrestees, 25 (92.6%) were reportedly Male and 2 (7.4%) were reportedly Female. The most common race of arrestees was White, representing 77.5% of arrestees. For ethnicity, the majority of arrestees were reported as Non-Hispanic (55.6%). The most common age ranges reported were Under 18 years old (25.9%) and 30-39 years old (22.2%).

Figure 33. Number of Victims per Month, Sexual Assault with an Object

Forcible Fondling

Definition: The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is unable to give consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.




Figure 38. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Forcible Fondling

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 1,880 unique offenses of Forcible Fondling, of those offenses, there were 2,132 unique victims of Forcible Fondling. The highest number of Forcible Fondling occurred in October, accounting for 202 of the 2,132 victims (Figure 37). The most common day of week reported was Friday (Figure 38), and the most common time of day reported was 00:00–00:59 (Figure 40).




Figure 39. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Forcible Fondling

The majority of victims were reported as Female (83.1%), and the remaining were reported as Male (15.6%) or the sex was Unknown (1.3%). Most victims were reported as White (73.5%) for race and as Non-Hispanic (55.0%) for ethnicity. As observed with the other forcible sex crimes (Forcible Rape, Forcible Sodomy, and Sexual Assault with an Object), the majority (70.3%) of victims for Forcible Fondling were Under 18 years old (Table 39). In 2021, there were 2,141 types of injuries reported, and the most common injury type reported was None, no injury (Table 40). There were 2,285 victim-to-offender relationships reported in 2021, and the most common categories reported were Within Family (39.0%) and Outside of Family but Known to the Victim (42.2%) (Figure 39).

The 2,132 unique victims of Forcible Fondling were the result of 1,880 unique offenses reported by law enforcement agencies in 2021. Of the 1,880 offenses, 1,826 offenses were reportedly completed, and 54 offenses were reportedly attempted. The most common premise type reported for a Forcible Fondling offense was a Living Place (Table 41). There were 1,880 criminal/gang activities reported in 2021, with the most common activity reported as None/Unknown (Table 43). Lastly, there were 1,883 weapons types reported with the Forcible Fondling offenses, the most common was Physical (i.e., Personal Weapons) (Table 42).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 157 unique arrestees of Forcible Fondling. Of the 157 arrestees, 151 were Male, and 6 were Female. Accounting for approximately 75.0% of arrestees, the most common race reported was White (Table 39), and the most common ethnicity reported for arrestees was Non-Hispanic (61.1%). The majority (83.4%) of arrestees were reportedly between 20 and 59 years old with the highest number of arrestees reported between 30 to 39 years old.

Figure 37. Number of Victims per Month, Forcible Fondling




Incest

Definition: Nonforcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.




Figure 42. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Incest

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 58 unique offenses of Incest, of those offenses, there were 71 unique victims of Incest. The highest number of Incest crimes occurred in January (Figure 41). The most common day of week reported was Monday (Figure 42), and the most common time of day reported was 00:00–00:59 (Figure 43).

Of the 71 victims, the majority (71.8%) were reportedly Female (Table 44). Eighty percent of victims were reported as White, and for 71.8% of victims, the ethnicity was reported as Unknown. The majority (84.5%) of victims were Under 18 years old (Table 44). Additionally, there were 86 victim-to-offender relationships in 2021, and due to the offense type, the most common category was Within the Family (Table 45).

The 71 victims of Incest were a result of 58 unique offenses. Of the 58 offenses of Incest, 55 offenses were completed and 3 offenses were attempted. The most common premise type reported was a Living Place, representing 91.4% of Incest offenses. (Table 46).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported one arrestee of Incest. The arrestee was reported as Male, Under 18 years old, White, and Non-Hispanic.

Figure 41. Number of Victims per Month, Incest






Statutory Rape

Definition: Nonforcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.




Figure 45. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Statutory Rape

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 126 unique offenses of Statutory Rape, of those offenses, there were 129 unique victims of Statutory Rape. The highest number of Statutory Rapes reportedly occurred in March (Figure 44). The most common day of week reported was Monday (Figure 45), and the most common time of day reported was 00:00–00:59 (Figure 46).

Of the 129 victims, the majority (94.6%) of victims were reportedly Female, and the remaining 5.4% of victims were reportedly Male (Table 47). The most common race reported for victims was White (82.2%), and the most common ethnicity for victims was reported as Unknown (57.4%). Due to the nature of Statutory Rape (see definition), the majority (128) of victims were under 18 years old; however, for one victim, their age was reported as Unknown. There were 151 victim-to-offender relationships reported in 2021, and the most common relationship category was Outside of the Family but Known to the Victim (Table 48).

The 129 unique victims of Statutory Rape were the result of 126 unique offenses reported by law enforcement agencies. Of the 126 offenses, 123 offenses were reportedly completed and 3 offenses were reportedly attempted. The most common premise type for Statutory Rape offenses was a Living Place (Table 49).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 16 unique arrestees of Statutory Rape. The majority of arrestees were reported as Male (87.5%), and the remaining individuals were reported as Female. The most common race reported for arrestees was White, with 13 arrestees, and over 50.0% of arrestees were reportedly Non-Hispanic (Table 47). The most common age range for arrestees was 20–29 years old, with 9 arrestees.

Figure 44. Number of Victims per Month, Statutory Rape






Human Trafficking - Commercial Sex Acts

Definition: Inducing a person by force, fraud, or coercion to participate in commercial sex acts, or in which the person induced to perform such act(s) has not attained 18 years of age.




Figure 48. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Human Trafficking-Commercial Sex Acts

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 23 unique offenses of Human Trafficking-Commercial Sex Acts, of those offenses, there were 23 unique victims of Human Trafficking-Commercial Sex Acts. The highest number of victims was reported in the month of October (Figure 47). Most Commercial Sex Acts occurred on a Thursday (Figure 48), and the most time of day reported was 00:00–00:59 (Figure 49).

Of the 23 victims, 73.9% were reported as Female. Representing nearly 70.0% of victims, the most common race was White, and for over 70.0% of victims, the ethnicity was reported as Unknown. Law enforcement agencies reported 39.1% of victims were Under 18 years old (Table 50). There were 30 victim-to-offender relationships reported in 2021 (Table 51). Of those relationships, 93.3% were reported as either Outside of the Family but Known to the Victim (66.7%) or Not Known by the Victim (26.7%).

In 2021, there were an equal number of unique victims and unique offenses for Commercial Sex Acts, meaning there was one victim per offense. Of the 23 offenses, 19 offenses were reportedly completed, and 4 offenses were reportedly attempted. The most common Premise Type for where a Commercial Sex Act occurred was a Living Place (Table 52).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 8 arrestees for Human Trafficking-Commercial Sex Acts. Over half (62.5%) of arrestees were reportedly Male, and the remaining (37.5%) were reportedly Female. With 5 arrestees, Black was the most common race reported, and Non-Hispanic was the most common ethnicity reported. Lastly, 50.0% of arrestees were reportedly between 20 and 29 years old (Table 50).

Figure 47. Number of Victims per Month, Human Trafficking-Commercial Sex Acts






Figure 50. Number of Victims per Month, Human Trafficking-Involuntary Servitude




Figure 51. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Human Trafficking-Involuntary Servitude






Kidnapping/Abduction




Figure 54. Number of Victims per Day of Week, Kidnapping/Abduction

Definition: The unlawful seizure, transportation, and/or detention of a person against his/her will or of a minor without the consent of his/her custodial parent(s) or legal guardian

agencies law enforcement reported 608 unique offenses of Kidnapping/Abduction, of those offenses, there 692 victims were unique of Kidnapping/Abduction. Both March, and June, were the most common reported months (Figure 53). The highest number of Kidnapping/Abductions reportedly occurred on a Sunday (Figure 54), and the highest number occurred between 00:00 and 00:59 (Figure 55).

Of the 692 victims, 75.9% of victims were reported as Female. The most common race reported for victims was White, with 464 victims. Of the three reportable ethnicities, Non-Hispanic was the most commonly reported, 326 victims (Table 56). Law enforcement agencies reported nearly 30.0% of victims were Under 18 years old. There were 730 injury types reported in 2021, and the most common type of injury reported was None, meaning the victim did not experience an injury (Table 58). In 2021, there were 805 victim-to-offender relationships; the most reported relationship type was Outside the Family but Known to Victim, with 418 relationships. However, the relationship category of Within the Family to the victim accounted for 25.6% of relationships.

In 2021, the 692 unique victims of Kidnapping/Abduction were the result of 608 unique offenses. Of the 608 offenses, 554 offenses were reported as completed, and 54 offenses were reported as attempted. The most reported premise type was Living Place, (67.1%) (Table 59). There were 608 criminal/gang activities reported in 2021, the majority (95.4%) of which were reported as None/Unknown. In 2021 there were 642 types of weapon types reported for Kidnapping/Abduction offenses; the most reported weapon type was Physical (i.e., Personal Weapons, Asphyxiation) (Figure 56).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 251 unique arrestees of Kidnapping/Abduction. The most common sex reported for arrestees was Male, with 224 arrestees (Table 56). White was the most common (58.6%) race reported for arrestees followed by Black representing 33.1%. Accounting for two-thirds of arrestees, the most common ethnicity reported was Non-Hispanic. Of the 251 arrestees, 91.2% were between 20 to 59 years old, with the majority reported between 20 and 39 years old.

Figure 53. Number of Victims per Month, Kidnapping/Abduction








Crimes Against Property

Section 2

Summary:

In 2021, there were 151,583 property crimes reported by law enforcement agencies in Oklahoma (Table 61). The three most common property offenses reported were Larceny (42.7%), Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property (15.3%), and Burglary/Breaking and Entering (13.8%). The three least reported property crimes were Arson (810), Extortion/Blackmail (428), and Bribery (14).

Robbery

Definition: The taking of anything of value from the control, custody, or care of another person by force or threat of force and/or by putting the victim in fear of immediate harm.




Figure 57. Number of Offenses per Month, Robbery

In 2021, there were 1,752 Robbery offenses reported by local law enforcement. The majority of offenses were reported in January (Figure 57), on the weekend days (Friday-Sunday), and in the evening hours (Figure 58). Of the 1,752 Robberies, 11.4%, or 199, were reported as attempted offenses while the remaining were reported as completed. When reporting a Robbery, an agency is capable of reporting up to three weapon types used in the incident. There were 1,830 weapon types reported for the 1,752 offenses. The most common weapon type reported was Firearms, which contributed to 42.7% of weapon types (Figure 59). The three most common premise types (Table 62) reported for where a Robbery occurred in 2021 were Living Place (35.0%), Commercial (27.9%), and Public Transportation/Roadways (25.8%). There were 2,992 property items stolen as a result of the 1,752 Robberies, which resulted in a loss of \$3,360,709 (Table 63).

Lastly, there were a total of 2,197 victims of Robbery in 2021 (Table 64). While Robbery is classified as a property crime, it is unique in that it requires using force/fear to take property. Therefore, the most common type of victim reported for Robbery was an Individual (88.4%). For victims who were reported as an Individual, the most common demographics (Table 65) reported were Male (58.9%), 20-39 years old (51.8%), White (68.2%), and Unknown ethnicity (56.2%). In 2021, there were 427 individuals who were linked to a Robbery offense and reported as an arrestee. Of those arrestees, 83.6% were Male, 61.1% were 20-39 years old, 48.2% were Black, and 56.0% were Non-Hispanic.

Figure 59. Number of Weapon Types, Robbery



Arson

Definition: To unlawfully and intentionally damage or attempt to damage any real or personal property of another person or entity by fire or incendiary device.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 810 Arsons with 93.3%, or 756, reported as completed. The highest number of Arsons occurred in the month of March (Figure 60). Overall, Arsons were distributed relatively even between the hours of the day, but the majority reportedly occurred on a Thursday (Figure 62). Sixty percent of arsons occurred at a Living Place which can include locations such as a Hotel/Motel, Residence/Home, etc. Law enforcement agencies reported a property loss of \$13,406,479 due to an Arson offense in 2021. There were 177 unique individuals associated with an Arson offense reported as an arrestee. Most arrestees were reported as the following demographics: Male (78.5%), 30-39 years old (39.5%), White (67.2%), and Non-Hispanic (53.7%) (Table 66).

Figure 60. Number of Offense per Month, Arson





Figure 61. Number of Offense per Time of Day, Robbery

Figure 62. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Robbery




Figure 63. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Robbery



Extortion/Blackmail

Definition: To unlawfully obtain money, property, or any other thing of value, either tangible or intangible, through the use of force, misuse of authority, threat of criminal prosecution, threat of destruction of reputation or social standing, or through other coercive means.

There were 428 Extortion/Blackmail offenses reported by law enforcement agencies in Oklahoma. Of those offenses, 188 (43.9%) were reported as attempted, and 240 (56.1%) were reported as completed. The highest number of Extortion/Blackmail offenses occurred in July, accounting for 11.9% (Figure 64). Overall, there was not a significant distribution of offenses among the days of the week; however, 15.0% of offenses reportedly occurred between 00:00-00:59. It should be noted that an offense reported at 00:00-00:59 could indicate the actual occurred time was unknown. Of all Extortion/Blackmail offenses, 63.3% occurred at a Living Place (Figure 66), and the most common weapon type used in the commission of an Extortion/Blackmail was All Other Types (i.e., Fire/Incendiary Device, None, Other, and Unknown). For offenses where items were classified as Stolen/Etc., the total loss was \$592,154 (Table 69). In 2021, there were 10 arrestees who were associated with an Extortion/Blackmail offense (Table 70). Arrestees were primarily reported as Male (60.0%), 20-29 years old (50.0%), White (60.0%), and an Unknown ethnicity (50.0%).

Figure 64. Number of Offenses per Month, Extortion/Blackmail




Figure 66. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Extortion/Blackmail



Burglary/Breaking and Entering

Definition: The unlawful entry into a building or some other structure to commit a felony or a theft.

In 2021, there were 20,950 Burglary/Breaking and Entering offenses reported. Of those, 19,652 were reported as completed, and 1,298 were reported as attempted. The offender(s) used forcible entry in 13,481 (64.5%) of Burglary/Breaking and Entering offenses, and for 7,469 (35.7%) the offender(s) did not use force. The number of Burglary/Breaking and Entering offenses per month were distributed relatively evenly with 7.0-8.9% of offenses occurring per month (Figure 67). While there was little difference for the number of offenses per day of week, the highest number, 16.1%, occurred on a Friday (Table 71). The highest number (2,618) of Burglary/Breaking and Entering offenses reportedly occurred from 00:00-00:59; however, this time of day could be used if it was unknown as to when the offense occurred. It was noted that other common times for a Burglary/Breaking and Entering to occur were 08:00-08:59, 12:00-12:59, and 17:00-18:59 (Figure 68). Sixty-six percent of Burglary/Breaking and Entering offenses occurred at a Living Place (Figure 69). Law enforcement reported a Stolen/Etc. loss of \$48,307,333 for property related to a Burglary/Breaking and Entering offense, and \$2,569,850 of property was recovered (Table 72). Law enforcement reported there were 2,719 arrestees who were associated with a Burglary/Breaking and Entering offense. Of those arrestees, 78.0% were Male, 34.8% were 30-39 years old, 66.4% were White, and 61.1% were Non-Hispanic (Table 73).

Figure 67. Number of Offenses per Month, Burglary/Breaking & Entering




Figure 69. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Burglary/Breaking & Entering



Motor Vehicle Theft

Definition: The theft of a motor vehicle.




Figure 71. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Motor Vehicle Theft





Figure 72. Number of Offenses per Time of Day, Motor Vehicle Theft

There were 15,334 Motor Vehicle Thefts reported in 2021. Of those, 14,903 offenses were completed, and 431 were attempted, meaning no motor vehicle was stolen. Overall, the number of Motor Vehicle Thefts per month were relatively evenly distributed with 6.9-9.9% occurring per month (Figure 70). Additionally, the number reported per day of week were nearly equal each day (Figure 71). The majority of Motor Vehicle Thefts occurred between 00:00-00:59 (Figure 72). The most common premise type reported for a Motor Vehicle offense was a Living Place (53.1%) followed by a Public Transportation/Roadway (24.9%). As previously mentioned, there were 14,903 motor vehicles stolen in 2021 with the most common type of vehicle reported as an Automobile. The total loss reported for Motor Vehicle Theft Was \$158,073,103 (Table 74). There were 1,760 arrestees associated with a Motor Vehicle Theft offense. Of those arrested, 73.5% were Male, 61.0% were between 20 and 39 years old, 65.6% were White, and 55.4% were Non-Hispanic (Table 75).

Figure 70. Number of Offenses per Month, Motor Vehicle Theft

Figure 73. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Motor Vehicle Theft



Counterfeiting/Forgery

Definition: The altering, copying or imitating of something, without authority or right with the intent to deceive or defraud by passing the copy or thing altered or imitated as that which is original or genuine, or the selling, buying, or possession of an altered, copied, or imitated thing with the intent to deceive or defraud.




Figure 74. Number of Offenses per Month, Counterfeiting/Forgery





Figure 76. Number of Offenses per Time of Day, Counterfeiting/Forgery

In 2021, there were 2,928 Counterfeiting/Forgery offenses reported, and 2,808 (95.9%) were reported as completed. The highest number of offenses were reported in July accounting for 10.2% of all Counterfeiting/Forgery crimes (Figure 74). Most Counterfeiting/Forgery offenses occurred between Monday and Friday with 10.0% or less occurring on a Saturday or Sunday (Figure 75). Law enforcement reported most offenses occurring between 00:00-00:59; however, this could be a place holder if it was unknown when the offense occurred. It was noted that when compared to the remaining 23 hours, the highest number of offenses occurred between 08:00-17:59 (Figure 76). There were 3,229 criminal/gang activities reported for the 2,928 Counterfeiting/Forgery offenses (Figure 77). The most common activity reported was Possessing/Concealing (1,302)followed by Using/Consuming (803).Most Counterfeiting/Forgery offenses occurred at a Commercial (35.7%) premise (i.e., Convenience Store, Department/Discount Store, etc.) or at a Financial Institution (30.2%) (i.e., Bank/Savings & Loan). In 2021, the value of property loss for Counterfeited/Forged property was reported as \$4,304,087 (Table 76). Lastly, law enforcement reported there were 377 individuals associated with a Counterfeiting/Forgery offense reported as an arrestee (Table 77). Most arrestees were reported as a Male (62.3%), 30-39 years old (39.0%), White (69.5%), and Non-Hispanic (67.4%).

Figure 75. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Counterfeiting/Forgery

Figure 77. Number of Criminal/Gang Activity Types for Counterfeiting/Forgery




Figure 78. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Counterfeiting/Forgery



Embezzlement

Definition: The unlawful misappropriation by an offender to his/her own use or purpose of money, property, or some other thing of value entrusted to his/her care, custody, or control.

Law enforcement agencies in Oklahoma reported there were 2,008 Embezzlement offenses reported in 2021, and 1,992 (99.2%) were reported as completed. The highest number of Embezzlements (11.4%) were reported in January (Figure 79), and the most occurred on a Monday (Table 78). Similar to other property crimes, the highest number reportedly occurred between 00:00-00:59, but for Embezzlement, the second most common time of day was 12:00-12:59 (Figure 80). Forty-seven percent of Embezzlements took place at a Commercial premise which includes premises such as Commercial/Office Building, Department/Discount Store, etc. (Figure 81). In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported there were 2,661 property items Stolen/Etc. due to Embezzlement, which resulted in a total loss of \$22,897,989 (Table 79). There were 162 individuals associated with an Embezzlement offense reported as an arrestee (Table 80). Of those arrested, 50.6% were Male, 37.0% were 20-29 years old, 66.7% were White, and 59.3% were Non-Hispanic.

Figure 79. Number of Offenses per Month, Embezzlement




Figure 81. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Embezzlement



Stolen Property Offenses

Definition: Buying, receiving, possessing, selling, concealing, or transporting any property with the knowledge that it has been unlawfully taken, as by burglary, embezzlement, fraud, larceny, robbery, etc.




Figure 82. Number of Offenses per Month, Stolen Property Offenses





Figure 84. Number of Offenses per Time of Day, Stolen Property Offenses

In 2021, law enforcement agencies in Oklahoma reported 3,330 Stolen Property Offenses; of those, 99.5%, or 3,313, were reported as a completed offense. While the number of offenses reported per month varied, the highest number were reported in January (Figure 82), and the lowest number occurred on a Sunday or Saturday (Figure 83). Most Stolen Property Offenses reportedly occurred between 00:00-00:59 (Figure 84); however, this could be a result of not knowing the exact time the offense occurred. The majority (45.8%) of Stolen Property Offenses occurred at a premise type reported as a Public Transportation/Roadway (Figure 85); other common premise types included a Living Place (29.1%) and a Commercial premise (13.2%). For Stolen Property Offenses, law enforcement reported there were 1,683 property items recovered, resulting in a recovered value of \$3,978,362. Lastly, law enforcement agencies reported there were 2,354 individuals reported as an arrestee who were associated with a Stolen Property Offense. Of those individuals, 77.7% were reported as Male, 64.0% were reported as 20-39 years old, 69.7% were reported as White, and 58.1% were reported as Non-Hispanic (Table 81).

Figure 83. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Stolen Property Offenses

Figure 85. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Stolen Property Offenses



Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property

Definition: To willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure any public or private property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it.





Figure 86. Number of Offenses per Month, Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property

In 2021, there were 23,157 Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property crimes reported with 23,012, reported as a completed crime. number Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property offenses reported each month (Figure 86) varied; however, the highest number occurred on a Friday (Table 82). Of all offenses, 10.6% reportedly occurred between 00:00-00:59; however, it was noted the number reported per hour increased beginning at 16:00 and ending at 23:00 (Figure 87). Fifty-one percent of Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property offenses occurred at a Living Place with other common premise types reported as Public Transportation/Roadway and a Commercial property 88). 2021, 27,134 (Figure In there were property items reported Destroyed/Damaged/Vandalized resulting in a loss of \$136,657,955. Lastly, there were 2,394 individuals reported as an arrestee who were associated with a Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property offense. Of those arrestees, 76.2% were Male, 58.9% were between the ages of 20-39 years old, 59.9% were White, and 61.2% were Non-Hispanic (Table 83).

Figure 88. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property



Bribery

The offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting anything of value (e.g., a bribe, gratuity, or kickback) to sway the judgment or action of a person in a position of trust or influence.

In 2021, there were 14 Bribery offenses reported. Of those, 7 were reported as attempted crimes, and 7 were reported as completed crimes. Due to the limited number reported, there were no clear trends for when or where they occurred. For the 14 Bribery crimes, there were 7 property items reported as Stolen/Etc. which resulted in a loss of \$12,325. Lastly, there were 7 individuals reported as an arrestee and associated with a Bribery offense.





Figure 89. Number of Offenses per Month, Bribery

Fraud

Definition: The intentional perversion of the truth for the purpose of inducing another person or other entity in reliance upon it to part with something of value or to surrender a legal right.




Figure 91. Number of Offenses per Month, Fraud

Law enforcement agencies reported 16,167 Fraud offenses in 2021. Of those offenses, 94.8%, or 15,328, were reported as completed while the remaining were attempted. The number of Fraud offenses reported per month varied, but the majority occurred in March (Figure 91), and the majority occurred Monday-Friday (Figure 92). Nineteen percent of Fraud offenses occurred between 00:00-00:59; however, this could indicate the reporting agency did not know a precise occurred time. It was noted a higher number of offenses were reported between 08:00-08:59 and 12:00-12:59. Most Fraud offenses reportedly occurred at a Living Place (37.8%); however, other common premise types included Commercial premises and Miscellaneous premises. When reporting a Fraud offense, an agency can report a specific type of Fraud (see Glossary). In 2021, the most common type of Fraud offense was False Pretenses/Swindle/Confidence Game (6,338) followed by Credit Card/Automated Teller Machine (ATM) Fraud (4,769), and Impersonation (2,105). Law enforcement agencies reported there were 17,893 property items Stolen/Etc. as a result of a Fraud offense, resulting in a loss of \$43,048,306. Lastly, there were 993 individuals reported as an arrestee who were associated with at least one Fraud offense. Of those individuals, 62.8% were Male, 39.0% were 30-39 years old, 70.0% were White, and 67.3% were Non-Hispanic (Table 88).

Figure 92. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Fraud





Figure 93. Number of Offenses per Time of Day, Fraud

Figure 94. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Fraud




Figure 95. Number of Fraud Offenses by Type



Larceny

Definition: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another person.




Figure 99. Number of Larceny Offenses by Type

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 64,705 Larceny offenses. Of all Larceny offenses, 97.8%, or 63,259, were reported as a completed offense, and the remaining were reported as an attempted Larceny. The highest number of Larceny offenses occurred between the months of July to September (Figure 96), and the highest number reportedly occurred on a Friday (Table 89). Most offenses reportedly occurred between 00:00-00:59; however, as previously mentioned, this could indicate the time the offense occurred was unknown at the time of the report. Other commonly reported times were 08:00-08:59, 12:00-12:59, and 17:00-17:59 (Figure 97). Law enforcement agencies reported the majority of Larceny offenses occurred at a Living Place (i.e., Residence/Home, Hotel/Motel, Shelter-Mission/Homeless) or at a Commercial premise (i.e., Department/Discount Store, Convenience Store, Grocery/Supermarket, etc.). Together, these premises accounted for 72.4% of Larceny offenses. In addition to reporting the premise type, the agency reports the Larceny by a type (Figure 99). In 2021, the most common type of Larceny reported was All Other Larceny, representing 32.9%. Other common types were Theft from Motor Vehicles (26.1%), Shoplifting (20.7%), and Theft from Buildings (10.3%). There were 120,353 property items reported as Stolen/Etc. due to Larceny which resulted in a total loss of \$105,041,614. Law enforcement agencies reported there were 12,465 property items Recovered, which accounted for \$9,329,846. Lastly, there were 7,136 individuals linked to at least one Larceny offense who were reported as an arrestee (Table 91). The most common demographics reported for an arrestee were Male (54.3%), 20-39 years old (59.7%), White (68.4%), and Non-Hispanic (63.4%).



Figure 98. Number of Offenses per Premise Type, Larceny



Crimes Against Society

Section 3

Summary:

The following sections include the number of offenses, arrestees, and property (if applicable) for Crimes Against Society. For crime reporting purposes, Crimes Against Society are counted by the number of unique <u>offenses</u>.

In 2021, there were 32,714 unique offenses of Crimes Against Society. The most common category/offenses reported was Drug/Narcotic Offenses (79.1%), Weapon Law Violations (16.4%) and Pornography/Obscene Material (3.2%) (Table 92). The least common category/offenses reported were Gambling Offenses (0.003%), Animal Cruelty (0.6%) and Prostitution Offenses (0.7%). In particular, the highest reported Crime Against Society was Drug/Narcotic Violations (52.8%), and the lowest reported Crime Against Society was Operating/Promoting/Assisting Gambling (0.003%).

Drug/Narcotic Violations

Definition: The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance.




Figure 101. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Drug/Narcotic Violations




Figure 102. Number of Offenses per Time of Day, Drug/Narcotic Violations

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 17,284 unique offenses of Drug/Narcotic Violations. Of the 17,284 offenses, the highest number of offenses reported in March with 1,627, and the lowest number of offenses were reported in February with 1,042. (Figure 100). Friday was the most common day of the week for Drug/Narcotic Violations to occur on in 2021, and Sunday was the least common day of the week (Figure 101). For Drug/Narcotic Violations, the highest number (1,811) were reported between 00:00 and 00:59, and the lowest number (178) were reported between 06:00 and 06:59 (Figure 102).

Over 60.0% of offenses, occurred on Public Transportation/Roadways, and 13.1% occurred at a Living Place (Table 94). In 2021, there were 20,982 types of criminal activity reported; the majority (72.0%) were reported as Possessing/Concealing, followed by Using/Consuming (9.8%), and Transporting/Transmitting/Importing (7.9%) (Table 95). There were 24,487 property items reported as a drug and seized due to a Drug/Narcotic Violation. Marijuana and Amphetamines/Methamphetamines were the most common types of drugs reported, accounting for 40.7% and 34.1%, respectively (Table 96). It should be noted that the number of property items reported does not correlate to the amount seized by law enforcement.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 15,716 unique arrestees for Drug/Narcotic Violations. Of the 15,716 arrestees, 70.6% were Male, and 29.4% were Female. The most common race of arrestees was White (68.5%), followed by Black (19.0%), and American Indian/Alaskan Native (10.0%) (Table 93). Non-Hispanic was the most common ethnicity reported for arrestees, accounting for 66.1% of individuals. Of the 15,716 arrestees, the majority (32.2%) were reportedly between 30 and 39 years old (Table 93).

Figure 100. Number of Offenses per Month, Drug/Narcotic Violations



Drug Equipment Violations

Definition: The unlawful manufacture, sale, purchase, possession, or transportation of equipment or devices utilized in preparing and/or using drugs or narcotics.




Figure 104. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Drug Equipment Violations





Figure 105. Number of Offenses per Time of Day, Drug Equipment Violations

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 8,581 unique arrestees of Drug Equipment Violations. The highest number of offenses occurred in March, with 792 offenses, and the lowest number of offenses occurred in February, with 512 offenses (Figure 103). Friday was the most common day of the week reported, and Monday was the least common day of week reported. It was noted there was a continuous increase in offenses from Monday to Friday, and a decrease over the weekend (Figure 104). As observed with Drug/Narcotic violations, the highest number (748) of Drug Equipment Violations occurred at 00:00 – 00:59, and the lowest number (94) occurred at 06:00–06:59 (Figure 105).

The most common premise types reported for where a Drug Equipment Violation occurred were Public Transportation/Roadways (6,026) and Living Places (1,113) (Table 97). There were 10,461 types of criminal activity reported for Drug Equipment Violations, and the most common were Possessing/Concealing (77.0%), Using/Consuming (10.2%) and Transporting/Transmitting/ Importing (8.5%) (Table 99).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 8,200 unique arrestees of Drug Equipment Violations. Of the 8,200 unique arrestees, 67.1% were Male, and 32.9% were Female. The most common age range reported for arrestees was 30-39 years old, representing 34.6% of arrestees. Lastly, for race and ethnicity, the majority were reported as White (74.8%) and Non-Hispanic (69.4%).

Figure 103. Number of Offenses per Month, Drug Equipment Violations

Pornography/Obscene Materials

Definition: The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, publishing, sale, purchase, or possession of sexually explicit material, e.g., literature or photographs.




Figure 106. Number of Offenses per Month, Pornography/Obscene Material

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 1,058 unique offenses of Pornography/Obscene Materials. January had the highest number of offenses while July had the lowest number of offenses (Figure 106). The highest number of Pornography/Obscene Materials offenses occurred on Tuesday (19.2%), and the lowest number occurred on a Saturday (9.2%) (Figure 107). Forty percent of offenses, or 455, occurred at 00:00 – 00:59 (Figure 108).

For the 1,058 of Pornography/Obscene Materials offenses, 25 offenses were reported as attempted crimes, and the remaining (1,033) were reported as completed crimes. The premise categories of Miscellaneous (i.e., Cyberspace, Other/Unknown) and Living Place (i.e., Hotel/Motel, Residence/Home) were the most common premises reported for Pornography/Obscene Materials crimes. Together, these premises accounted for 88.0% of offenses. There were 1,283 criminal activity types reported in 2021, of which Exploiting Children was the most reported, representing 43.6% of all types (Table 101).

In 2021, there were 66 unique arrestees for Pornography/Obscene Materials. The majority (93.9%) of arrestees were Male, and 6.1% were Female. The most common race reported was White, and 56.1% of arrestees were reportedly Non-Hispanic (Table 100). Lastly, 31.8% of arrestees were between 20 and 29 years old.

Figure 107. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Pornography/Obscene Materials






Law enforcement agencies reported one offense of Operating/Promoting/Assisting Gambling in 2021. The one offense occurred in July, on Thursday, and between 04:00 and 04:59. The premise type was Other/Unknown, and there were 6 arrestees of Operating/Promoting Gambling.

Prostitution

Definition: To engage in commercial sex acts for anything of value.




Figure 110. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Prostitution

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 184 unique offenses of Prostitution. The highest number occurred in April, with 24 offenses, and the lowest number occurred in December, with 6 offenses (Figure 109). The highest number of Prostitution offenses occurred between Tuesday through Thursday accounting for 73.4% of offenses (Figure 110). Nearly (48.9%) of offenses occurred between 19:00 and 22:59 (Figure 111).

Of the 184 offenses of Prostitution, 150 offenses were reported as completed, and 34 offenses were reported as attempted. The most common premises for where Prostitution offenses occurred were Living Place (68.5%) and Commercial (12.0%) (Table 105).

In 2021, there were 173 unique arrestees for Prostitution. Of those arrestees, 118 were reportedly Female, and 55 were reportedly Male. Fifty-two percent of arrestees were White, 25.4% were Black, and 19.7% were Asian (Table 104). The lowest reported races were Unknown (0.6%) and American Indian/Alaskan Native (2.3%). The most common ethnicity reported was Non-Hispanic representing 68.2% of arrestees. Nearly 60% of arrestees were between 20 and 39 years old (Table 104).

Figure 109. Number of Offenses per Month, Prostitution




Assisting or Promoting Prostitution

Definition: To solicit customers or transport persons for prostitution purposes; to own, manage, or operate a dwelling or other establishment for the purpose of providing a place where prostitution is performed; or to otherwise assist or promote prostitution.




Figure 113. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Assisting/Promoting Prostitution

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 26 unique offenses of Assisting/Promoting Prostitution. The highest number of Assisting or Promoting Prostitution offenses occurred in August with 6 offenses, and lowest number, with only 1 per month, occurred in May, June, and July (Figure 112). Fifty percent of offenses occurred on either a Monday (19.2%) or a Wednesday (30.8%) (Figure 113). No significant trend could be established for what time offenses occurred (Figure 114).

Of the 26 offenses of Assisting or Promoting Prostitution, 21 offenses were completed and 5 offenses were attempted. Law enforcement agencies reported 73.1% of offenses occurred at a Living Place (Table 107), which can include premises such as Hotel/Motel and Residence/Home.

In 2021, there were 12 unique arrestees for Assisting or Promoting Prostitution. Two-thirds of arrestees were reportedly Male, and the remaining arrestees were reportedly Female (Table 106). For race, the majority were reported as Black (58.3%), followed by White (25.0%), and Asian (16.7%). For ethnicity, two-thirds were Non-Hispanic, and the remaining had an Unknown ethnicity. Lastly, the majority of arrestees were reportedly between 30 and 39 years old.

Figure 112. Number of Offenses per Month, Assisting/Promoting Prostitution




Purchasing Prostitution

Definition: To purchase or trade anything of value for commercial sex acts.




Figure 116. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Purchasing Prostitution

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 22 unique offenses of Purchasing Prostitution. Of the 22 offenses, August was the most reported month, with 5 offenses, and the least reported month was March (Figure 115). Fifty-nine percent of offenses occurred on Thursday, and Monday and Friday were the lowest reported days with 4.5% offenses each (Figure 116). The most common time day reported was 18:00–18:59, with 6 offenses. While a significant trend cannot be determined due to the limited data, it was noted that most Purchasing Prostitution offenses were reported in evening to night hours (17:00-23:59).

Of the 22 offenses of Purchasing Prostitution, 21 offenses were reported as completed, and the remaining offense was reported as attempted. The most common premise type for where a Purchasing Prostitution offense occurred was a Living Place, with 19 offenses, and the remaining offenses occurred at Public Transportation/Roadways, with 3 offenses (Table 109).

In 2021, there were 21 unique arrestees of Purchasing Prostitution, and all arrestees were reported as Male. White (16) was the most common race reported for arrestees, and the remaining individuals were reported as Black (4) and Asian (1) (Table 108). Two-thirds (66.7%) of arrestees were reported with an Unknown ethnicity, and the remaining were reported as Non-Hispanic (19.0%) and Hispanic (14.3%). All arrestees were reportedly between 20 and 69 years old, and the most common age range reported was 40 to 49 years old, with 8 arrestees.

Figure 115. Number of Offenses per Month, Purchasing Prostitution




Weapon Law Violations

Definition: The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosions, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons.




Figure 119. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Weapon Law Violations

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 5,367 unique offenses of Weapon Law Violations. August was the most common month reported with 501 offenses, and February was the least reported month with 359 offenses (Figure 118). The highest number of offenses occurred on a Saturday, representing 16.7% offenses, and the lowest number occurred on a Monday, representing 12.7% of offenses (Figure 119). The most common time of day for when a Weapon Law Violation occurred was 00:00–00:59, with 509 offenses, and the lowest number occurred at 06:00–06:59, with 71 offenses (Figure 120).

Of the 5,367 Weapon Law Violations, 5,323 offenses were completed, and 44 offenses were attempted. The most common premise type reported was Public Transportation/Roadways, representing 55.1% of offenses (Table 111). There were 5,872 criminal activities (Table 120) reported for Weapon Law Violations in 2021. Of those activities, the most common were Possessing/Concealing (79.3%), followed by Using/Consuming (8.4%), and Transporting/Transmitting/Importing (7.7%). There were 5,558 weapon types reported in 2021, and of those, the most common was Firearms, representing 91.4% of all weapons (Table 113).

In 2021, there were 4,361 unique arrestees of Weapon Law Violations. The majority (88.7%) of arrestees were Male, and 11.3% were Female. The most common race for arrestees was White (55.1%), followed by Black (35.8%), and American Indian/Alaskan Native (7.5%) (Table 110). Non-Hispanic was the most common ethnicity reported for arrestees, followed by Unknown (33.0%) and Hispanic (6.9%) (Table 110). The majority of arrestees were between 20 to 29 years old.

Figure 118. Number of Offenses per Month, Weapon Law Violations






Animal Cruelty

Definition: Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly taking an action that mistreats or kills any animal without just cause, such as torturing, tormenting, mutilation, maiming, poisoning, or abandonment.




Figure 122. Number of Offenses per Day of Week, Animal Cruelty

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 191 unique offenses of Animal Cruelty. Of the 191 offenses, the highest number (25) of offenses occurred in January and December, while the lowest number (8) of offenses occurred in March and October (Figure 121). The most common day of week reported for Animal Cruelty offenses was Friday, with 36 offenses, and the least common day of week was Saturday, with 23 offenses (Figure 122). The most common time of day for when an Animal Cruelty offense occurred was 00:00 through 00:59, with 26 offenses (Figure 123).

Of the 191 animal cruelty offenses, 188 offenses were completed, and 3 offenses were attempted. The most common premise types reported for an Animal Cruelty offense was Living Place (67.5%), followed by Public Transportation/Roadways (15.2%), and Outdoors (11.0%). In 2021, there were 193 criminal activities reported, and the most common was Intentional Abuse and Torture, representing 51.8% of activities (Table 116). Other criminal activity types included: Simple/Gross Negligence (37.3%), Organized Abuse (9.3%), and Animal Sexual abuse (1.6%).

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 45 unique arrestees of Animal Cruelty. Of the 45 arrestees, 27 arrestees were Male, and 18 arrestees were Female. Arrestees were reported as White (68.9%), Black (24.4%), and American Indian/Alaskan Native (6.7%) (Table 114). Figure 121. Number of Offenses per Month, Animal Cruelty






Group B Offenses

Summary:

The following section provides the number of arrests for each Group B offense. A Group B offense tends to be more minor in nature when compared to other crimes in this report. For crime reporting purposes the FBI only collects arrest data for Group B offenses (Table 117). Data in the following sections displays the number of unique persons arrested per Group B offense. An individual could be duplicated if they were linked to more than one Group B offense.

In 2021, the most common Group B arrests reported were All Other Offenses (30.2%), Driving Under the Influence (24.0%), and Drunkenness (21.2%). The least common Group B arrests were reported for Runaway (197), Bad Checks (14), and Peeping Tom (13). It should be noted that while Runaway is a listed offense type, it is not considered a criminal offense. A breakdown of arrestees for each Group B offense is provided in the following sections.

Bad Checks

Definition: Knowingly and intentionally writing and/or negotiating checks drawn against insufficient or nonexistent funds.

In 2021, there were 15 individuals arrested for a Bad Check offense. Of those arrestees, 71.4% were reported as Male, 35.7% were between the ages of 30-39, 71.4% were reported as White, 64.3% were reported as Non-Hispanic (Table 118). Of all arrestees, 92.9%, or 13, were arrested On-View, meaning the individual was arrested without a warrant or previous incident report. The remaining individual's arrest type was reported as Taken Into Custody, which would indicate the individual had a previously filed warrant or incident report.

Curfew/Loitering/Vagrancy Violations

Definition: The violation of a court order, regulation, ordinance, or law requiring the withdrawal of persons from the streets or other specified areas; prohibiting persons from remaining in an area or place in an idle or aimless manner; or prohibiting persons from going from place to place without visible means of support.

In 2021, there were 442 arrestees of Curfew/Loitering/Vagrancy Violations. Of those arrested, 67.6% were Male, 74.7% were Under 18-years-old, 68.3% were White, and 48.6% were Non-Hispanic. Of all arrestees, 54.5% were reportedly arrested On-View, 36.2% were Summoned/Cited, which would indicate they were summoned/cited to court, and 9.3% were Taken Into Custody.

Disorderly Conduct

Law enforcement agencies reported there were 2,507 individuals arrested who were linked to a Disorderly Conduct offense. Property Loss and Recovered

Summary:

Unlike the UCR Program, the SIBRS data collection collects the number of items and value of property loss due to several types of loss (i.e., Burned, Counterfeited/Forged, Destroyed/Damaged/Vandalized, Recovered, etc.). In 2021, there were 319,038 property items reported which totaled to \$652,353,972 (Table 129). The most common types of property loss reported were Stolen/Etc. (65.8%), Seized (11.7%), Destroyed/Damaged/Vandalized (8.5%), and Recovered (8.2%). The types of loss which resulted in the highest value were Stolen/Etc. (58.8%), Destroyed/Damaged/Vandalized (20.9%), and Recovered (17.2%). It should be noted that not every type of loss requires the value of the property.

In 2021, there were 209,995 property items reported as Stolen/Etc. and 26,254 items were reported as Recovered (Table 130). The three most common types of property items reported as Stolen/Etc. were Vehicles and Accessories, Currency/ID/Information, and Merchandise/Goods; however, when considering the value of stolen property, the most common categories were Vehicles and Accessories, Currency/ID/Information, and Small Equipment/Supplies/Tools. In 2021, the most common type of property reported as Recovered was Vehicles and Accessories, Merchandise/Goods, and Currency/ID/Information. The property type that contributed to the highest value recovered was Vehicles and Accessories, Industrial/Heavy Equipment, and Miscellaneous items. In 2021, the property type with the highest recovery rate was Vehicles and Accessories with a recovery rate of 31.3%.



Hate/Bias Crime

Definition: A criminal offense committed against a person or property, which is motivated by the offender's bias against race, religion, ethnic/National origin, sexual orientation, or disability.

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 71 unique incidents of Hate/Bias Crime. Of the 71 incidents, Race/Ethnicity/Ancestry was the most common type of hate/bias reported, with 53 incidents (Table 131). For Race/Ethnicity/Ancestry, Anti-Black was the highest reported type of hate/bias reported in 2021, followed by Anti-American Indian/Alaskan Native. The second most common type of hate/bias reported was Sexual Orientation, with 14 incidents, and the most common type reported of that group was Anti-Male Homosexual with 9 incidents.




Figure 126. Number of Incidents per Day of Week, Hate/Bias Crime

Of the 71 incidents of Hate/Bias Crime, the highest number of incidents (11) occurred in October. The majority (19.7%) of incidents occurred on a Tuesday; however, 18.3% occurred on a Thursday or Saturday (Figure 126). The most common time of day for an incident to occur was 12:00–12:59, representing 12.7% of incidents. The majority of Hate/Bias Crimes occurred at either a Living Place (42.3%), a Commercial property (18.3%), or Public Transportation/Roadways (16.9%).

There were 93 total offenses related to Hate crimes. Table 134 shows the offenses associated with a hate/bias offense. Crimes against Persons was the most common offense category (65.6%) and Crimes Against Society was the least common (2.2%). The most common offenses were Simple Assault (35.5%) and Intimidation (23.7%).

There were 88 unique victims of reported Hate/Bias Crimes in 2021. Of the 88 victims, 70 victims were persons (i.e., Individual (69) and Officer (1)), and 18 were non-person victims (i.e., Business (6), Government (1), and Society/Public (11)). Of the 70 person victims, 61.4% were Male, 34.3% were Female, and 4.3% had an Unknown sex. The majority of victims were reported as White (51.4%) or Black (32.9%). For ethnicity, 55.7% of victims were Non-Hispanic, 10.0% were Hispanic, and the remaining were reported as Unknown (34.3%). The most common age ranges reported for victims were Under 18 (14.3%), 20–29 (25.7%), 30–39 (24.3%), and 40–49 (14.3%).

In 2021, there were 19 arrestees associated with Hate/Bias Crimes. Of the 19 arrestees, 15 were Male and 4 were Female. For race, arrestees were reported as either White (73.7%), American Indian/Alaskan Native (15.8%), or and Black (10.5%) (Table 132). The majority (84.2%) of arrestees were reported as Non-Hispanic, with the remaining arrestees reported as either Hispanic (10.2%) or Unknown (5.3%). All arrestees were between 18 and 69 years old, with the highest number reported between 30 and 39 years old.

Figure 125. Number of Incidents per Month, Hate/Bias Crime




Domestic Abuse

Definition: any act of physical harm or the threat of imminent physical harm which is committed by an adult, emancipated minor, or minor child thirteen (13) years of age or older against another adult, emancipated minor or minor child who is currently or was previously partner, family, or household member.




Figure 129. Number of Incidents per Day of Week, Domestic Abuse

In 2021, law enforcement agencies reported 24,837 unique incidents that had a domestic abuse offense and a domestic relationship. For the purposes of this report, a domestic abuse offense included: Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter, Negligent Manslaughter, Justifiable Homicide, Forcible Rape, Forcible Sodomy, Sexual Assault with an Object, Forcible Fondling, Aggravated Assault, Simple Assault, Intimidation, and Kidnapping/Abduction. The highest number of incidents occurred in May, and lowest number occurred in February (Figure 128). Sunday was the most common day of week (15.5%), while Wednesday was the least common day of week, (13.1%) (Figure 129). Most incidents occurred between 00:00 and 00:59, and the lowest number occurred between 05:00 and 05:59 (Figure 131).




Figure 130. Number of Victim-to-Offender Relationships, Domestic Abuse

There were 29,285 unique victims involved in the 24,837 incidents, and of those victims, 28,344 were reported as Individual or Law Enforcement Officer. The remaining 941 victims were non-person victims (i.e., Business, Society, Government) (Table 137). Of the 28,344 unique person victims, 71.2% of were Female, 27.9% were Male, and the remaining 1.0% were Unknown. The most common race reported for victims was White (68.4%), and 95.1% of victims were reported as Non-Hispanic or Unknown ethnicity. The three most common age ranges reported for victims were Under 18 (17.7%), 20 - 29 (22.6%), and 30-39 (23.7%). There were 25,565 injury types reported, and the most common injury type was Apparent Minor Injury (Table 136). In 2021, there were 31,342 victim-to-offender relationship types reported, and 53.2% were reportedly Within the Family, meaning the victim and offender were related, married, etc. (Figure 130).

There were 27,862 unique offense types reported. Of those 27,864 offense types were reportedly completed, and 121 offense types were reportedly were attempted. The majority (84.8%) of offense types occurred at a Living Place. Law enforcement reported 23,692 weapon types used, and the most common were Physical Weapons, which can include Personal Weapons (Hands, Fists, Feet, Teeth, etc.) and Asphyxiation.

In 24,837 incidents, law enforcement agencies reported 7,271 unique arrestees (Table 135). Of the all arrestees, 77.5% were Male and 22.5% were Female. The most common race reported for arrestees was White (64.7%), and Non-Hispanic was the most common ethnicity reported (61.4%). The majority (78.3%) of arrestees were between the ages of 20 and 49 years old.

Figure 128. Number of Incidents per Month, Domestic Abuse



Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted




Figure 133. Number of Victims per Day of Week, LEOKA




Figure 134. Number of Weapon Types, LEOKA

In SIBRS a victim can be reported as an officer for offenses of Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter, Aggravated Assault, Simple Assault, and Intimidation. For the purposes of this section, data reported is for victims/incidents where a law enforcement officer was killed or assaulted (LEOKA). In 2021, there were 1,282 unique victims who were reported as a law enforcement officer. Of those victims, no officers were killed in 2021, and all victims were reportedly assaulted. The highest number of assaults occurred in October, and the lowest number occurred in August (Figure 133). Nearly 50.0% of officers were assaulted on the weekend (Friday through Saturday), while the remaining assaults occurred Monday through Thursday (Figure 134). The most common time of day reported for a law enforcement officer assault to occur was 20:00–20:59, representing 7.3% of victims, and the second most common time was 00:00-00:59 (Figure 136).

When examining how officers were assigned, 39.9% of officers were assigned to One-Man Vehicle–Assisted followed by One-Man Vehicle–Alone (Table 141). In addition to reporting the type of assignment, law enforcement agencies reported what type of call the officer(s) was responding to at the time of assault. In 2021, the most common call type was Handling, Transporting, Custody of Prisoners (24.2%). In 2021, 1,017 officers were wearing a bulletproof vest, 198 officers were not wearing a bulletproof vest, and for 67 officers it was unknown if they were wearing a bulletproof vest.

Of the 1,282 officers, 56.4% officers were Male, 35.2% had an Unknown sex, and 8.4% were Female. Over 50.0% of officers were reportedly White, and for 68.6% of officers the ethnicity was reportedly Unknown. The majority of officers were either between 20 and 39 years old or their age was Unknown (Table 138). In 2021, there were 1,219 injury types reported; and the most common injury type reported was None (Table 139).

There were 1,095 unique offenses where officers were assaulted. Public Transportation/Roadways and Living Place were the most common premise types where officers were assaulted (Table 140). There were 1,054 weapons used in the offenses, and the most common weapon type was Physical Weapons (i.e., Hands, Fists, etc.) (Figure 135).

In 2021, there were 893 unique arrestees who were involved with a LEOKA incident. Of the 893 arrestees, 71.1% were Male, and 28.9% were Female. The most common races for arrestees were White (56.8%), Black (26.5%), and American Indian/Alaskan Native (14.3%). The most common ethnicity reported was Non-Hispanic representing 61.1% of arrestees. Over 75.0% of arrestees were reportedly between the ages of 20 and 49 years old (Table 138).

Figure 132. Number of Victims per Month, LEOKA






Figure 136. Vest Worn by Officer, LEOKA



Crimes by Contributors

Summary:

There were 439 law enforcement agencies in 2021 that provided data to Oklahoma's SIBRS program. The section beginning on page 9-3 (Table 143) is a listing of law enforcement agencies who reported to the State Incident-Based Reporting System (SIBRS). The table includes the number of crimes reported for Crimes Against Persons, Property, and Society, the population (where applicable), and the crime rate (where applicable) per agency. The table is sorted alphabetically by county first, then by the Originating Agency Identifier (ORI) assigned to the law enforcement agency by the FBI. The Oklahoma UCR Program publishes the total number of offenses reported by the law enforcement agency. The Oklahoma UCR Program does not estimate any data for an agency who was not consistent and/or did not report data for that calendar year. As previously mentioned, the data provided in this report is what was reported as of August 18-24, 2022. For these reasons, there may discrepancies when comparing data in this publication with data in *Crime in the United States*.


Definition: Persons employed as full-time sworn officers and full-time civilian employees.

Annually, the OSBI sends a survey to all reporting law enforcement agencies throughout the state to determine the number of individuals employed in law enforcement. With the exception of persons who perform guard or protection duties and who are not paid from police funds (i.e., school crossing guards, special officers, and merchant police), these figures reflect the number of full-time sworn personnel with full arrest power, including the chief, sheriff, commissioner, and superintendent. The figures do not include employees of law enforcement agencies that do not contribute to the SIBRS program.

Civilians include clerks, radio dispatchers, meter maids, stenographers, mechanics, etc., provided these persons are full-time employees of the agency. Neither employees who are compensated from a source other than police funds, nor those receiving salaries from federal grants are included.

In 2021, Oklahoma's law enforcement employment rate was 3.2 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Glossary/ Offense Definitions

Section 11

Group A

Crimes Against Persons

13A-13C Assault Offenses:

An unlawful attack by one person on another.

13A Aggravated Assault:

An unlawful attack by one person upon another wherein the offender uses a dangerous weapon or displays it in a threatening manner or the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury, or where there was a risk for serious injury/intent to seriously injure.

13B Simple Assault:

An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a dangerous weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.

13C Intimidation:

To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct without displaying a dangerous weapon or subjecting the victim to an actual physical attack.

09A-09C Homicide Offenses:

The killing of one human being by another.

09A Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter:

The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

09B Negligent Manslaughter:

The killing of another person through gross negligence.

09C Justifiable Homicide (Not a Crime):

The killing of a perpetrator of a serious criminal offense by a peace officer in the line of duty, or the killing, during the commission of a serious criminal offense, of the perpetrator by a private individual.

100 Kidnapping/Abduction:

The unlawful seizure, transportation, and/or detention of a person against his/her will or of a minor without the consent of his/her custodial parent(s) or legal guardian.

11A-11D Forcible Sex Offenses:

Any sexual act directed against another person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

11A Rape (except Statutory Rape):

The carnal knowledge of a person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is unable to give consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

11B Sodomy:

Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is unable to give consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

11C Sexual Assault with An Object:

To use an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is unable to give consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

11D Fondling:

The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is unable to give consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

36A-36B, Non-Forcible Sex Offenses:

Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.

36A Incest:

Nonforcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

36B Statutory Rape:

Nonforcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

64A-64B Human Trafficking Offenses:

The inducement of a person to perform a commercial sex act, or labor, or services, through force, fraud, or coercion.

Human trafficking has also occurred if a person under 18 years of age has been induced, or enticed, regardless of force, fraud, or coercion, to perform a commercial sex act.

64A Human Trafficking, Commercial Sex Acts:

Inducing a person by force, fraud, or coercion to participate in commercial sex acts, or in which the person induced to perform such act(s) has not attained 18 years of age.

64B Human Trafficking, Involuntary Servitude:

The obtaining of person(s) through recruitment, harboring, transportation, or provision, and subjecting such persons by force, fraud, or coercion into involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery (not to include commercial sex acts)

Crimes Against Property

200 Arson:

To unlawfully and intentionally damage or attempt to damage any real or personal property of another person or entity by fire or incendiary device.

510 Bribery:

The offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting anything of value (e.g., a bribe, gratuity, or kickback) to sway the judgment or action of a person in a position of trust or influence.

220 Burglary/Breaking & Entering:

The unlawful entry into a building or some other structure to commit a felony or a theft.

250 Counterfeiting/Forgery:

The altering, copying, or imitating of something, without authority or right, with the intent to deceive or defraud by passing the copy or thing altered or imitated as that which is original or genuine, or the selling, buying, or possession of an altered, copied, or imitated thing with the intent to deceive or defraud.

290 Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property (except Arson):

To willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure any public or private property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it.

270 Embezzlement:

The unlawful misappropriation by an offender to his/her own use or purpose of money, property, or some other thing of value entrusted to his/her care, custody, or control.

210 Extortion/Blackmail:

To unlawfully obtain money, property, or any other thing of value, either tangible or intangible, through the use or threat of force, misuse of authority, threat of criminal prosecution, threat of destruction of reputation or social standing, or through other coercive means.

26A-26H Fraud Offenses (except Counterfeiting/Forgery):

The intentional perversion of the truth for the purpose of inducing another person or other entity in reliance upon it to part with something of value or to surrender a legal right.

26A False Pretenses/Swindle/Confidence Game:

The intentional misrepresentation of existing fact or condition or the use of some other deceptive scheme or device to obtain money, goods, or other things of value. Only includes fraud offenses that do not fit any of the definitions of the specific subcategories of fraud.

26B Credit Card/Automated Teller Machine Fraud:

The unlawful use of a credit/debit card, credit/debit card number, or automatic teller machine for fraudulent purposes.

26C Impersonation:

Unlawfully representing one's position and acting in the character or position to deceive others and thereby gain a profit or advantage, or enjoy some right or privilege.

26D Welfare Fraud:

The use of deceitful statements, practices, or devices to unlawfully obtain welfare benefits

26E Wire Fraud:

The use of an electric or electronic communications facility to intentionally transmit a false and/or deceptive message in furtherance of a fraudulent activity.

26F Identity Theft:

Wrongfully obtaining and/or using another person's personal data (e.g., name and date of birth, Social Security number, driver's license number).

26G Hacking/Computer Invasion:

Gaining access to another person's or institution's computer software, hardware, or networks without authorized permissions.

23A-23H Larceny/Theft Offenses:

The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another person.

23A Pocket-picking:

The theft of articles from another person's physical possession by stealth where the victim is not immediately aware a theft occurred.

23B Purse-snatching:

The grabbing or snatching of a purse, handbag, etc., from the physical possession of another person.

23C Shoplifting:

The unlawful taking of goods or merchandise exposed for sale by a person (other than an employee).

23D Theft From Building:

The unlawful taking of items from within a building which is either open to the general public or to which the offender has legal access.

23E Theft From Coin-Operated Machine or Device:

The unlawful taking of items from a machine or device that is operated or activated by the use of coins.

23F Theft From Motor Vehicle (except Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts or Accessories):

The unlawful taking of articles from a motor vehicle, locked or unlocked.

23G Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts or Accessories:

The unlawful taking of any part or accessory affixed to the interior or exterior of a motor vehicle in a manner which would make the item an attachment of the vehicle or necessary for its operation.

23H All Other Larceny:

All thefts which do not fit any of the Larceny/Theft or specific subcategories identified in UCR.

240 Motor Vehicle Theft:

The theft of a motor vehicle.

120 Robbery:

The taking of anything of value from the control, custody, or care of another person by force or threat of force and/or by putting the victim in fear of immediate harm.

280 Stolen Property Offenses:

Buying, receiving, possessing, selling, concealing, or transporting any property with the knowledge

that it has been unlawfully taken, as by burglary, embezzlement, fraud, larceny, robbery, etc.

Crimes Against Society

35A-35B Drug/Narcotic Offenses:

The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances and the equipment or devices utilized in their preparation and/or use.

35A Drug/Narcotic Violations:

The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled substance.

35B Drug Equipment Violations:

The unlawful manufacture, sale, purchase, possession, or transportation of equipment or devices utilized in preparing and/or using drugs or narcotics.

39A-39D Gambling Offenses:

To unlawfully bet or wager money or something else of value; assist, promote, or operate a game of chance for money or some other stake; possess or transmit wagering information; manufacture, sell, purchase, possess, or transport gambling equipment, devices, or goods; or tamper with the outcome of a sporting event or contest to gain a gambling advantage.

39A Betting/Wagering:

To unlawfully stake money or something else of value on the happening of an uncertain event or on the ascertainment of a fact in dispute.

39B Operating/Promoting/Assisting Gambling:

To unlawfully operate, promote, or assist in the operation of a game of chance, lottery, or other gambling activity.

39C Gambling Equipment Violations:

To unlawfully manufacture, sell, buy, possess, or transport equipment, devices, and/or goods used for gambling purposes.

39D Sports Tampering:

To unlawfully alter, meddle in, or otherwise interfere with a sporting contest or event for the purpose of gaining a gambling advantage.

370 Pornography/Obscene Material:

The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, publishing (publication), distributing (distribution), sale, purchase, or possession of sexually explicit material deemed legally obscene.

40A-40C Prostitution Offenses:

To unlawfully engage in or promote sexual activities for anything of value.

40A Prostitution:

To engage in commercial sex acts for anything of value.

40B Assisting or Promoting Prostitution:

To solicit customers or transport persons for prostitution purposes; to own, manage, or operate a dwelling or other establishment for the purpose of providing a place where prostitution is performed; or to otherwise assist or promote prostitution.

40C Purchasing Prostitution:

To purchase or trade anything of value for sex acts.

520 Weapon Law Violations:

The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons.

720 Animal Cruelty:

Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly taking an action that mistreats or kills any animal without just cause, such as torturing, tormenting, mutilation, maiming, poisoning, or abandonment.

Group B:

90A Bad Checks (except Counterfeit Checks or Forged Checks)

Knowingly and intentionally writing and/or negotiating checks drawn against insufficient or nonexistent funds.

90B Curfew/Loitering/Vagrancy Violations:

The violation of a court order, regulation, ordinance, or law requiring the withdrawal of persons from the streets or other specified areas; prohibiting persons from remaining in an area or place in an idle or aimless manner; or prohibiting persons from going from place to place without a visible means of support.

90C Disorderly Conduct:

Any behavior that tends to disturb the public peace or decorum, scandalize the community, or shock the public sense of morality.

90D Driving Under the Influence:

Driving or operating a motor vehicle or common carrier while mentally or physically impaired as the result of consuming an alcoholic beverage or using a drug or narcotic.

90E Drunkenness

To drink alcoholic beverages to the extent that one's mental faculties and physical coordination are substantially impaired

90F Family Offenses, Nonviolent:

Unlawful, nonviolent acts by a family member (or legal guardian) that threaten the physical, mental, or economic well-being or morals of another family member and that are not classifiable as other offenses such as assault, incest, and statutory rape.

90G Liquor Law Violations (except Driving Under the Influence)

The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages.

90H Peeping Tom

To secretly look through a window, doorway, keyhole, or other aperture for the purpose of voyeurism.

901 Runaway (Not A Crime)

A person under 18 years of age who has left home without the permission of his/her parent(s) or legal guardian.

90J Trespass of Real Property:

To unlawfully enter land, a dwelling, or other real property.

90Z All Other Offenses:

All crimes that are not Group A offenses and not included in one of the specifically named Group B crime categories listed previously.
